THE NEWS IN HELENA.

First came the dreadful disaster to Seattle, the chief city of the new state. From Seattle in the west it seemed as if fire had traveled directly east, for Etlensburg, a flourishing island-city, was nearly destroyed shortly after. Now in the extreme east, Spokane, which, next to Seattle, is the principal city of the state, suffers by far a worse calamity.

The city hab no fine engines. The population of Spekane is 20,000. The city possesses supposedly water works modeled after the Holly system with a capacity of 5,000,000 gallons daily. There were no fire engines, but it was believed that by the system in use five or six good-sized streams of water could be concentrated on any block in case of fire. The fire desartment was a volunteer one.
