A Little Activity. [From Sunday's Daily.]

The first genuine eruption to break the slumbering harmony of the constitutional convention took place yesterday afternoor when M. N. Johnson, of Lakota, the im pulsive political yeoman whose star shot zenithward during the early days of convention gossip, arose to annihilate Marshal McClure of the Devils Lake Capital. Upon rising Mr. Johnson read an editorial from the Capital, in which he was branded as a crank and his brother as an anarchist. Having read the editorial, he proceeded to oratorically walk all over the magnificent physique of McClure, and took occasion to swipe the press in general. He stated that at one time Major Edwards of the Fargo Argus had dared to speak of his brother as an anarchist, when by all the grade bis brother with the Johnsonian Forks. the gods, his brother with the Johnsonian blood surging with burning indignation through his veins addressed a letter to the major. "In that letter," exclaimed Mr. Johnson, "my brother told the slandering Edwards that he could take his choice of two means of reparition-he could publish a retraction or stand a libel suit for \$100,000; and he chose the latter." Mr. Hosk-ins of Pembina was among the candidates, and the first ballot gave Bowsfield 22; Dicem 13; Hoskins 9, and McIlvane 4. There being no choice another ballot was taken, resulting in the selection of Mr. Bowsfield.

Numerous consti-tutional conventions have been held in the country, and this convention should benefit by the experience of the past. The members should be given an opportunity to investigate the matter and a certain the number and nature of the committees needed.

Mr. Parsons agreed with Mr. Spaulding Mr. Parsons agreed with Mr. Spaulding as to the importance of the committees, but thought the matter could be settled at once, by having the names of the com-mittees read by the clerk, and each acted on separately. Then if there was an ob-noxious or unnecessary committee it could be dispensed with, and there would be no delay. delay.

Mr. Stevens said that as one of the members of the committee on rules, it would be gratifying to him to have the committee adopt the original motion for postpone-

Then was the cat out of the bag, the re-publicans rallied and the motion was defeated.

Mr. Camp moved that the convention adjourn, the motion prevailed and M. N. Johnson hastened to the chair to call the republicans together for a caucus.
