AT WORK AGAIN.

The Convention Reassembles at Olympia and Resumes Its Wrangling.

The Delegates Are Paying Particular Attention to the Tide Land Question.

Against Armed Detectives--Sunday in Olympia--Making Up the State.

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 15.—The convention met at 1 P.M., the president in the chair. Prayer by J. R. Chapman, of Olympia. Roll called and all present except Meers, Dyer and Fay (on leave), Gowey, Henry, Jamison, McReavy, J. Z. Moore, Stevenson (on leave) and Wilson.

On motion of Mr. Sullivan, of Tacoma, indefinite leave of absence was granted to Mr. Jamison on account of the death of his mother, at Whatcom.

On motion of Mr. Jones, the same privilege was granted to Dr. Willison, on account of sickness which required his attention.

Mr. J. Z. Moore came in and asked to be marked present on the second, granted.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE.

The president submitted a communication from Francis Miner of St. Louis in favor of woman suffrage. Referred to the committee on elections.

THE PUBLIC PRINTING.

Mr. Turner, from the committee on the judicial department, reported on the subject of the majority and minority report of the committee on printing relative to the proposition of W. D. Knight to do the public printing. The judicial committee reported that it was necessary to consider the matter for the convenience of the members in their duties, though he was sure the gentleman (Moore) had no such intention in offering the resolution.

Mr. Clegg's resolution was referred to the judiciary committee, and was referred to the committee on elections.

A telegram from Mr. Dyer was read concerning the printing of the state papers on the ground of missing railway connections. Granted.

Mr. Frosner, from the committee on mining, submitted a report on mining as corrected since Saturday, and explained that a few corrections had been made, and that all cases of disputed mileage were satisfactorily settled.

SECTION OF SCHOOL LANDS.

Mr. Schooley submitted a proposition to divide the school lands into two classes, the first class to include lands suitable for agriculture or grazing, and save therefrom, or fitness for residence or business purposes, and the second class for agricultural purposes. Lands of the first class may be sold at an appraised value of not less than \$10 per acre. A board of commissioners proposed to the legislature to appropriate the proceeds to the state land committee.

COMMITTEE ON PRINTING HURRIED UP.

Mr. Bachman complained of delay in getting printing done, blaming nobody, but wanting the trouble remedied, saying he would be through with it Saturday and Monday to get the amended reports printed.

Mr. Power, chairman of the committee on printing had informed him he moved to take up that report and should move it to print.

Mr. Bachman said he could not remember all the little details of such matters and wanted them printed. He moved to further postpone until tomorrow, in order that the printing could be done.

The president said that the resolution was too broad, but he made the point that it was.

anxious to have the handling of them. At the time of the adjournment of the session, Mr. Moore's demand for the ayes and nays, and they were ordered to be taken whenever Mr. Reed's motion should come up to a vote.

Mr. Griffiths asked whether Mr. Reed had not already withdrawn his motion for reference to a special committee. The president said no, that having been defeated, could only be withdrawn by general consent, and asked if there was any objection. None appearing, he ruled that the motion was withdrawn.

The question then turned on Mr. Griffiths' motion of Saturday's session, to strike out "state lands committee" and substitute "committee on corporation," so that the latter committee will, if the resolution is passed, be charged with the duty of investigating other works in the resolution itself.
