PRIME MINISTER'S MEETING WITH MR JIM MOLYNEAUX MP, MONDAY 29 NOVEMBER

The Prime Minister, accompanied by Mr Michael Ancram, M.P., met Mr James Molyneaux for nearly an hour from 1020 p.m. on 29 November at the House of Commons.

This was a private meeting. It is essential to protect the confidence of Mr Molyneaux and the contents of this letter must be carefully protected. No reference to the meeting should be made to Mr Molyneaux or to third parties.

Mr Molyneaux was in relaxed and genial form. He was much relieved that the day had gone so well, after a very difficult weekend. He thought that we might have emerged stronger as a result.

The Prime Minister mentioned his telephone conversation with the Taoiseach, and ran through the possible options for the Summit. He and Mr Molyneaux agreed that there was a risk of the IRA announcing a ceasefire which could be extended if their conditions were accepted.

Mr Molyneaux showed an interest in the possibility of our moving ahead with the Joint Declaration, if we could negotiate the deletion of paragraphs 10 and 11. With some tidying up, paragraph 9 should not be so objectionable. After some discussion of the Joint Declaration, Mr Molyneaux agreed to have a meeting at 1030 a.m. on the morning of 30 November with Mr Ancram and me to take a closer look at the Joint Declaration, in conjunction with the British draft Joint Statement shown to him last week.

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Mr Molyneaux also expressed the hope that some rapid progress could be made in strand one of the talks process. This would help with the Unionists. The Prime Minister asked Mr Ancram to consider whether it might be possible to announce by the end of the week that broad agreement had been established on an assembly.
