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Joint Declaration petween us, which is no doubt also Many thanks for your letter of 15 December about the "as of right sentence" in paragraph 4 of the Joint Declaration. We have had several subsequent conversations about this, and this is to record the outcome.

When I negotiated the inclusion of the words "as of right" in this sentence, Dr Mansergh, having consulted the Taoiseach, assured me that the Irish Government regarded the Joint Declaration as a political declaration having no legal status and were prepared to do whatever was necessary to make that clear. That was the background to my asking you on the evening of 14 December whether the Attorney would advise getting a written understanding with the Irish on this matter.

I tried on Dr Mansergh the draft side letter which you attached with your letter of 15 December. Dr Mansergh confirmed that the Irish Government stood by our oral agreement but said that the Irish Government would prefer to have a general understanding rather than one referring specifically to the "as of right sentence". His point was that this sentence was one of particular importance to the Nationalists and the existence, let alone the possible leaking, of a side letter referring to this specific sentence and appearing to qualify it could be very damaging indeed in relation to Nationalist opinion, particularly among the Provisional Army Council. He therefore suggested an alternative and more general formulation which ran as

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"I am writing to confirm our agreed understanding that the Joint Declaration of 15 December between the Taoiseach and the Prime Minister is a statement of their joint respective political positions and not of legal obligations."

You were unhappy about this, since there are some parts of the Joint Declaration, in particular the sentence referring to the commitment of both Governments to introduce the necessary legislation to give effect to a united Ireland achieved by consent, which clearly is a statement of a legal obligation. I suggested that we might try the alternative formulation that the Joint Declaration "does not change the legal position of either Government", but this did not meet the concern about the "as of right sentence", which was that it might be read as implying a pre-existing legal right.

We therefore concluded that no general statement was likely to take the trick which we are seeking and that I would not pursue the matter further with the Irish Government. Instead, we would rely on recording the oral understanding between us, which is no doubt also recorded in the Irish Government's papers.
