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Draft Communiqué

- 1. The Taoiseach, Mr. Albert Reynolds, T.D., and the Prime
 Minister, the Rt. Hon. John Major, M.P., met in London on
 Wednesday, 16th June. The Taoiseach was accompanied by the
 Tanaiste and Minister for Poreign Affairs, Mr. Dick Spring,
 T.D., and the Minister for Justice, Mrs. Maura Geoghegan—
 Quinn, T.D. The Prime Minister was accompanied by the
 Foreign Secretary, the Rt. Hon. Douglas Hurd, M.P., and the
 Secretary of State for Northern Ireland, the Rt. Hon. Sir
 Patrick Mayhew, Q.C., M.P.
- 2. The Taoiseach and Prime Minister senducted a full review of Anglo-Irish relations, and in particular of the situation in Northern Ireland. They reaffirmed the determination of both Governments to cooperate closely on all aspects of the problem, building on the solid foundation of their joint commitment to the Anglo-Irish Agreement.
- 3. The Taoiseach and Prime Minister discussed the security situation. They deplored the loss of life and human suffering wantonly caused by those who unleash the evils of terrorism, on the community. They pledged to sustain the close security cooperation on both sides to ensure that the threat of violence and terrorism from any quarter is confronted as effectively and comprehensively as possible by the resources of the law and that those who resort to such crimes are brought to justice.

- 4. The Taoiseach and the Prime Minister considered the prospects for a resumption of political dialogue. They agreed on the need to address adequately all of the key relationships involved and to work towards an outcome which would reconcile and accommodate the rights and identities of the two major traditions that exist in Ireland. Their aim is to achieve a new beginning for relationships within Northern Ireland, within the island of Ireland and between the peoples of the two islands, and thus make a decisive break with the legacy of past mistakes and failures and lay the foundations for lasting peace.
- 5. They called on the political parties in Northern Ireland to help play a full and constructive role in the search for political progress which the peoples of both islands fervently wish to see. They agreed that contacts would continue actively with the parties, with a view to seeking a way forward.
- 6. They agreed also to continue their discussions on those issues relating to the process which were ultimately for decision by the two Governments, so that their joint resources could be brought to bear a effectively possible on relaunching the search for political progress and guiding it towards success.

They agreed to take stock of the position and to decide on further staps at their next meeting, to be held in the second half of the year.

- 8. The Taoiseach and Prime Minister also reviewed progress in North/South economic cooperation and welcomed the full programme of work being carried out in the Anglo-Irish Conference in this field.
 - 9. The meeting reviewed current issues on the EC agenda,
 especially in the perspective of the forthcoming European
 Council. [Issues discussed included European economic
 recovery, the GATT enlargement, EC relations with Central
 and Eastern Europe and Russia, Yugoslavia, subsidiarity and
 openness, and the implementation of the Edinburgh Agreement
 on the Structural Funds].
