Meeting with the Irish Prime Minister, 16 June

Thank you for your letter of 21 May.

Our Ambassador has passed on the details of arrangements to the Irish. They are content with what you propose.

The Irish would like to bring a team of eight for the talks. This would probably be:

> The Taoiseach The Tanaiste

The Minister of Justice

The Secretary to the Government The Secretary of Foreign Affairs

The Secretary of Justice

The Irish Ambassador

The Head of the Anglo-Irish Division, DFA (Mr O' hUiginn)

The Irish Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Mr Dorr, attaches particular importance to the Irish Ambassador and Mr O hUiginn being present. In our view it is in our interests that both Mr Dorr and Mr Dalton (Secretary for Justice) should accompany their Ministers. Mr Dalton has been particularly helpful over security matters.

The Irish are assuming that the agenda for discussions will include preparations for the European Summit and Northern Ireland political talks and that we shall want to touch on cross-border security cooperation. The balance of their team reflects this. They have in mind that final agreement on the balance of discussions might be reached when British and Irish senior officials meet over dinner on
