## CABINET: NORTHERN IRELAND

- 1 Congratulations to the NI Secretary, the NIO and Cabinet Secretary. ( Roll . Lyw).
- Very wide support for Joint Declaration. House of Commons.
  Archbishops and Bishops. Clinton.
- Joint Declaration seems to have been pitched about right. Despite fears raised by advance leaks, nothing in it to which **Unionists** need to object. But Unionists inevitably suspicious, and we must work hard to reassure them and counter Paisley's distortions.
  - 4 **Provisionals** say they are disappointed that it does not give them more [helpful]. Difficult for them to reject outright, especially given Irish Government and SDLP support.
  - This puts the Provisionals in a dilemma. Don't know what they will decide. But the point all Government spokesmen must focus on today is: will the Provisionals give up violence for good and take the democratic path they will never have a better opportunity?
  - We should not be sidetracked into a debate about what happens down the road, but need clear lines on this. I understand that updated briefing material is being prepared and will be circulated to all Cabinet Ministers during the day. Anyone going on the media in the next few days should get a briefing line first from NIO.
