^CLINTON SUPPORTS MAJOR ON IRELAND, DENIES PRESSURE@

WASHINGTON, Dec 1 (Reuter) - President Clinton expressed apport for British Prime Minister John Major in his efforts for Bace in Northern Ireland but was not putting pressure on the ritsh leader ahead of his summit with Ireland's Prime Minister, S. officials said Wednesday.

A senior official reacted to a report in the Irish Times ewspaper that said Clinton had telephoned Major a week ago at ublin's request and urged him to 'go the extra mile for eace.''

The official confirmed the conversation took place but ejected any implication that Clinton was exerting pressure on aior.

He said Clinton told Major that 'he's supportive of the fforts Major is doing with the Irish government to resolve the ituation.'

'He i(Clinton) indicated that he would be prepared to do hatever he could to assist the process, but he also indicated hat he understands this is a situation for the parties over hat he understands at no point indicated that we would here to take care of and at no point indicated that we would ntervene, '' the official said.

He said the phone call was mostly about world trade and that situation in Northern Ireland came up at the end.

Major and Irish Prime Minister Albert Reynolds are pushing and with plans for a summit Friday seen as crucial to Northern aland peace initiatives that both men are working on.
