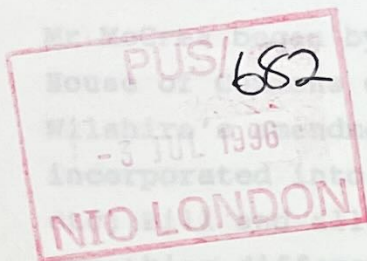

TALKS: MORNING AND EARLY AFTERNOON OF WEDNESDAY 3 JULY 1996

Summary

- Michael Ancram held a constructive bilateral discussion with Mr Empey, during which he outlined the Government's current thinking on a possible amendment to the rules of procedure. Mr Empey raised some issues which we were able to reflect in a revised draft amendment tabled later in the day.

Reg Empey made a helpful contribution which was consistent with his earlier discussion with Michael Ancram. While making it clear that the UUP would not sign up to Ground Rules, he suggested that the aim should be to agree a single set of rules of procedure as the sole text for the conduct of proceedings. In the event of any dispute, these should be referred to the Business Committee to resolve. Any changes would need to be arrived at by agreement. But the real issue is what practical effect Ground Rules will have on the ability to negotiate and achieve an outcome.

Michael Ancram suggested that the participants might aim to agree the following points

(ii) the two Governments have said that the participants are not required to sign up to Ground Rules.

Signed. (iii) Those who regard Ground Rules as providing enduring principles do not ask others to accept their view; and vice versa.

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- (iv) It would be sensible to agree a single set of self-contained rules of procedure which avoided gaps.

To replace current Rule 1:

- On behalf of the British Government Michael Ancram offered to table an amendment to Rule of Procedure No 1 (copy attached - as circulated to participants at 1.20pm)
- Several contributions from Mr McCartney and also the DUP. In Gregory Campbell, said that while the DUP was willing to consider the Government's amendment, he regarded the proposal to set aside the status of Ground Rules as untenable in circumstances when the Government regarded them as a key foundation of the negotiations.

The meeting adjourned at 12.30 to resume at 2.00pm.

- The British Government amendment was welcomed by Mr Trimble, who reserved his position, but spoke in such a way as to suggest he would go along with it.
- The amendment was welcomed by the DUP, and the Irish Government expressed agreement. But clarification on the meaning of certain words and phrases was sought by the DUP and UK UP.
- Following a suggestion by Seamus Mallon, the meeting was adjourned at 3.30pm subject to recall by the Chairman for bilaterals to take place between the parties to establish a basis of trust on which to move forward.

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BRITISH GOVERNMENT'S PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO RULES OF PROCEDURE

To replace current Rule 1:

1. The negotiations to which these rules of procedure refer and whose conduct they are intended to govern are, as provided for by Section 2(1) of the Northern Ireland (Entry to Negotiations, etc) Act 1996, the negotiations referred to in Command Paper 3232 (Ground Rules for Substantive All-Party Negotiations) published on 16 April 1996.
- 1A. The conduct of these negotiations is exclusively a matter for those involved in the negotiations. These rules of procedure are adopted for that purpose as the single set of rules of procedure for the conduct of the negotiations. These rules can only be amended by agreement, in accordance with the decision-making process outlined in paragraphs 23 through 28, following discussion in the Business Committee.
