## BILATERAL WITH THE TAOISEACH

You and copy addresses will have seen John Holmes' letter to me of 24 June reporting on bilaterals between the Prime Minister and the Taoiseach in the margins of the Florence European Council, together with my reply of today's date.

2. You will note that I have drawn attention to the sensitivity of the passage dealing with the elements of a possible settlement. The Secretary of State and Michael Ancram are particularly concerned that no hint should emerge which might (indeed almost certainly would be) be presented by unionists as a covert attempt to stitch up a deal behind their backs. I should therefore be grateful if those who have received this correspondence should treat it with great care.

3. On the point of substance, it would be helpful, in due course, to have your comments on the points raised by the Taoiseach

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about the nature of a final settlement. We may be able to draw on some of the work that was done in the aftermath of 'Frameworks' to identify the elements that would need to be covered in any overall settlement. However, the impression I get is that the Taoiseach is looking for something rather less specific which deals with the 'psychology of the situation', to coin a phrase.

I should valcome a word about the commission in Martin Howard's single of 26 June, following up the account of the dialogue between the Frime Minister and the Teolecach og 22 June in Florence.
