Resolutions for Debate

THE TWO FORUMS

Conference applauds the work of the Forum for Peace and Reconciliation, and acknowledges the success of the Alliance delegation in widening its vision.

Conference welcomes the creation of an elected Forum to work in parallel with the Talks body, urges the widest engagement of that Forum with representatives of the wider community, and condemns any attempt by any party to boycott this new mechanism for inter party and inter community dialogue. 2. ECONOMY

Conference supports the Northern Ireland Growth Challenge and recognises that increasing competitiveness and increasing the size of the private sector is key to solving the unemployment problem.

3. MITCHELL COMMISSION

Conference applauds the work of the Mitchell Commission, endorses without reservation the Mitchell principles and the recommendations of the report, and recognises that full commitment to the Mitchell principles and report is the only basis on which parties can be involved in the negotiations due to start on June 10.

4. YOUTH PARTICIPATION

Noting with concern that at the last general election 40% of under 25's failed to vote, Conference welcomes schemes such a 'M-Power' and 'Rock the Vote' which aim to address this problem of apathy and lack of participation.

Conference believes that the age at which candidates may stand for all elections should be reduced from 21 to 18, as one measure which may help to break the perceived barriers between politicians and young people. Conference also urges the young people of Northern Ireland to use their vote in the forthcoming elections since it is their future which will be negotiated.

Conference is appalled at the way the Government has dealt with the problem of BSE in cattle since by not slaughtering infected herds it has virtually destroyed our beef industry worth £500 million per year to the Northern Ireland Economy.
