EIGHTH DAY.

Tuesday July 21, 1857.

The Convention met pursuant to adjournment at 2 o'clock P. M., and was called to order by the President pro tem.

On motion, the reading of the Journal of the previous day was dispensed with.

On motion of Mr. BECKER, the Convention took a recess of fifteen minutes.

After the expiration of the recess,

On motion of Mr. BECKER, the Committee on Credentials was allowed until to-morrow in which to make their report.

There being no objection the Journal of the previous day was then read and approved.

Mr. MURRAY moved the Convention adjourn until to-morrow at 10 o'clock A. M.

Mr. DAVIS moved to amend by substituting 12 o'clock, M., and the vote being taken on the amendment, it was lost.

The vote then recurring on the original motion, it was decided in the negative.

On motion of Mr. BECKER, the following protem. officers of the Convention were elected in place of those selected on a previous day, who had failed in their attendance on the sittings of this body.

On motion of the same gentlemen, the Secretary was directed to inform the persons chosen of their election, and learn if they will accept the offices to which they are elected.

On motion of Mr. BUTLER, the thanks of the Convention were tendered to Geo. L. BECKER, Esq., for the next and elegant style in which the room has been fitted up under his supervision, for the session of the Convention.

On motion of Mr. AMES, the Convention then adjourned until 12 o'clock M., to-morrow.
