Dear Mr Oakden

The Dublin Embassy has passed a copy of an invitation to the Prime Minister sent by The Law Society of the University College Dublin to speak at a debate on Northern Ireland arranged for 14 November. Identical invitations have been sent to my Secretary of State and Michael Ancram.

Michael Ancram will accept his invitation and will speak at the debate on 14 November. The Secretary of State will <u>turn</u> down his invitation and it is recommended that the Prime Minister does so as well. A draft regrets letter to The Law Society is attached.

In addition, the Secretary of State agreed some time ago to participate in a debate organised by The Literary and Historical Society of UCD on 25 October. We are separately considering whether he should also address The Influential Institute of European Affairs later on this year. This is The Republic's most prestigious forum for the discussion of Irish policy.



In general we are looking to make more of Ministers' visits to Dublin, particularly in ensuring that they receive maximum coverage in the Irish media.
