You wrote to the Prime Minister on 31 January and 10 February.

There is a huge credibility gap between what you say in both letters and the actions of the IRA on the ground. Continuing IRA attacks carried out with murderous intent are incompatible with peace and with democracy. If you were serious about place melving before the election, you would tell for an involedate and less time.

The Government has repeatedly made clear its commitment to inclusive negotiations and its desire to see Sinn Féin take its place in such negotiations to represent its electorate. But it is also clear what must be done if that is to happen. The IRA must declare an unequivocal restoration of the ceasefire, and actions, words and all the circumstances must be consistent so that the statutory requirements set out in paragraphs 8 and 9 of the Ground Rules are met before an invitation to Sinn Fein to participate in the negotiations can be issued.

The process which would need to follow a ceasefire declaration, in order to sure that it was intended to be genuinely unequivocal, was set out in the Government's statement of 28 November. That explained clearly the criteria that would be applied. The Government will not depart from that position; nor will it negotiate

the restoration of a ceasefire which should not have been ended no

The Government has always said, since the IRA abandoned its ceasefire a year ago, that any meeting with Government officials was subject to events on the ground. The gulf, however, between the IRA's actions on the ground and your words cannot permit any meeting with officials at present. But if it appeared a genuine IRA ceasefire were attainable, and this was reflected in events on the ground, then the Government would consider whether a meeting for the purpose of explaining any practical issues which arose would be helpful.

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
