- value this opportunity to meet today;
- grateful for the very great personal commitment which each of you have made and continue to make to the talks process.
- · pleased that the talks will again benefit from your skilled and fair chairmanship;

New government/ Resumption of Talks

- Northern Ireland will continue to be a high priority for this government and for me personally. I had a very useful discussion with the President.
- · want to see early progress onto issues of substance in the talks;
- this means injecting new momentum into the process and finding a way through
 on decommissioning as a matter of urgency. The 2 Governments are
 endeavouring to work up joint proposals for early submission to the parties.
- the <u>UUP</u> vote held up well in the general election and they won an extra seat.
 Hope this will give them fresh confidence in the talks.
- want to see Sinn Fein in the talks on the same basis as the other participants;
- we have said that no party can have a veto on progress at the talks;
- Loyalists: concerned about recent attacks attributed to Loyalists this will need to be handled carefully in the talks - importance of the government acting justly, and with principle.

Sinn Fein

 have authorised meetings between Sinn Fein and officials, subject to events on the ground;

- hope that this new initiative will result in them making themselves eligible to join the talks soon;
- if not, will have no hesitation in moving ahead without them: they cannot hold the democratic process to ransom;
- the President's personal involvement has been vital: will continue to work closely with the Administration to achieve the peaceful and honourable settlement which we all want to see;
- officials have reported some encouraging signs from their two meetings with Sinn Fein;
- they are negotiating hard on issues of interest to them, particularly the question of how soon they could enter talks after a ceasefire;
- in the event of an unequivocal restoration of the ceasefire, and consistency of words and deeds, there would be no unnecessary delay to their entry to talks.

Decommissioning

- would like the two governments together to make an early attempt to break out
 of the decommissioning impasse and set a date for the launch of substantive
 negotiations;
- agreement between the two governments increases the pressure on the UUP to acquiesce;
- also need to give the UUP cover;
- would value any help you can give in moving this forward with the Irish and UUP;
- aware of Irish concerns but the reality is that unless both governments are committed to work to bring about decommissioning during the negotiations and to creating the mechanisms for this, the UUP will not engage;
- interested in your views on this and the other issues?

SPEAKING NOTE/PRESS STATEMENT ANNEX B

In advance of the resumption of multi-party talks in Northern Ireland on Tuesday 3

June, the Prime Minister {and the Secretary of State for Northern Ireland} today

met the Talks Chairmen, Senator Mitchell, General de Chastelain and Mr Holkeri.

The meeting provided a valuable and timely opportunity to exchange views on the talks process. All agreed that it was important that all the participants returned to the table with the necessary will and desire to see the talks process through to a successful conclusion.

The Prime Minister reiterated his desire to see an inclusive talks process, but again made it clear that it was for Sinn Fein to decide whether they wished to play their part in determining the future of Northern Ireland. The door remained open to them, but only if there were an unequivocal ceasefire by the IRA, reflected in words and deeds, and a firm commitment to democratic principles.

The Prime Minister said:

There is no alternative to democratic dialogue. Terrorism and democracy do not, and cannot, go hand in hand.

I ask all the parties who are meeting again tomorrow to return to the negotiations with a renewed sense of purpose and a firm determination to drive the process through to a successful conclusion. A great deal rests on their shoulders and I for one do not under estimate the task that lies ahead of them. I hope that by approaching the issues in a positive frame of mind and by showing a willingness to recognise the views of others it will be possible for real progress to be made. This is a new opportunity for everyone involved in the talks to prove the value of

political dialogue to the Northern Ireland people and to create a better future for all parts of the community. I wish the participants well.
