

Dear Mr. Molyneaux,

I have heard that you have been told of the existence of a letter from me to an Irish official containing criticisms of you and Archbishop Eamer.

It is of the greatest possible importance to me to assure you that there is no such genuine document. I have sent no letters at all to the Irish Government in connection with the Joint Declaration, let alone any criticising you or Archbishop Eamer. If the document can be produced or compared with my handwriting it will be shown to be false.

1. Since Mr Jones Party signed this off, The Embassy in Dublin have reported that the Irish Foreign Minister, not the Taoiseach, will speak alongside the Foreign Secretary.
2. This somewhat weakens the CONFIDENTIAL case for the Foreign Secretary's attendance. But the bilateral balance is still firmly in favour of his going. The EU case is as before. In short, same recommendation, but a little less strong.
